<u>Student Parking Areas</u> - Students must have a MBSS Student Parking Pass registered with MBSS and can only park in Student Parking areas:

- 1. Student parking area by the gym
- 2. Along the fence line towards Pickleball courts (student designated area only, not visitors area)
- 3. The dirt lot past Jim Lind Arena.

All students with motorized transportation including EBikes, EScooters and Motorbikes must register their mode of transport with the school.

Students may not park in Staff Assigned Spaces, in Visitor Parking, or in the back of the school. Students who park in areas other than ones designated for student parking may be towed.

Students are reminded to be careful when walking to and from school, especially on Riffington Place. Please use the sidewalk and do not walk down the middle of the road. We have had a few close calls and we want to keep everyone safe!

We can each accept and embrace everyday challenges to help learn from personal struggles and mistakes.


SAFETY

Online Learning for Parents, Caregivers, and Guardians

This series is designed to support parents, caregivers, and guardians across BC with tools and strategies to help with substance use prevention in the home. In this document, you will find three webinars recorded live between February 2024 and May 2025, each containing a one-hour presentation and a 30-minute live Q&A. You will also find an additional set of questions with recorded answers to assist in applying these concepts to real-life circumstances. The purpose of these sessions is to equip adults with skills that will help youth and adolescents make healthy decisions to support their well-being both now and in the future.

Note: These sessions do not address intervention strategies for substance use challenges, if your child is struggling, please refer to erase for more support.



Conversations that Promote Substance Use Prevention

This webinar explores six practical conversation strategies for adults that help children and youth learn to make healthy decisions that support their long-term well-being.

Subject: Public Health Nurse Wellness Clinics in the School Settings

To students & their parents, guardians, or representatives:

As part of Interior Health (IH) - Central Okanagan's efforts to provide access to public health nursing (PHN) support and services, IH has been offering in-school PHN Wellness Clinics for all grades and clinics will continue until the end of the school year.

At the Wellness Clinics in the school, Public Health Nurses will be available to talk with students and answer any questions about public health nursing services, such as health and wellness promotion/disease prevention information, and resources. This is also a great opportunity for senior high school students to meet with a public health nurse to assess their immunization history and ensure they have all the necessary vaccinations before they graduate. Some post-secondary schools/training programs require immunization history prior to starting the program.

Additionally, based on information gleaned from the most recent 2023 McCreary Adolescent Survey indicating a growing concern from students regarding a variety of health-related topics, these in-school clinics will offer improved access for students to reach out to a health professional.

Checking immunization status:

Students and parents/guardians are encouraged to review their own immunization status. HealthGateway provides secure access to health records, including immunizations. Please visit:

Parents, students and schools can now sign up to receive email or text alerts when the school bus route is delayed.

To register for alerts and to view a complete list of bus routes displaying the current status, select the school bus icon on our website at www.sd23.bc.ca or go to the site directly at https://schoolbusstop.sd23.bc.ca

Our first priority is the safety and well-being of our students. Due to the varied reasons our school bus routes may be delayed or in extreme situations, cancelled, it is not practical for drivers or staff to personally phone all those affected. Safety is everyone's responsibility and we must all be diligent when staying up to date on the status of our school bus routes.

All school bus route cancellations and delays in excess of 10 minutes will be posted on the "School Bus Stop"

If you have signed up for the alerts, upon posting the delay, you will receive an email or text with the route delay, length of delay and reason for the delay.

You could also expect to see general alerts when weather conditions or an emergent situation arises regarding the bus route.
